IT Tips and Tricks

If you need an alternative to using a regular mouse^{*}, there are several options available. This is excellent news for people suffering from carpal tunnel syndrome, after a stroke, if you have fine motor disability or other wrist and hand strain and struggle to use a run-of-the-mill mouse. Each of these alternatives has its unique features and benefits. Consider trying out different options to see which one works best for you or for people you support. Here are some options:





PEN MOUSE Shaped like a pen can be used on any surface. ROLLER MOUSE Positioned at the keyboard's base and has a roller bar that can be



VERTICLE MOUSE Held vertically and reduces wrist strain. **TRACKBALL MOUSE** A mouse with a large ball that can be rotated with the palm or fingers.



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JOYSTICK MOUSE Resembling a joystick that can be tilted in different directions to control the cursor.



FINGER TRACKBALL MOUSE A mouse with a trackball that can be controlled with the thumb or index finger.



TOUCHPAD MOUSE A touch-sensitive surface that can move the cursor with the fingers.

> *A computer mouse is an input device used with a computer or tablet. Moving a mouse along a flat surface can move the cursor to different items on the screen.

All about the NDS In conversation with Jason Mckey

NDS's Queensland State Manager

National Disability Services (NDS) - not to be confused with the NDIS - stands as Australia's foremost advocate for non-government disability service organisations. comprising a robust network of over 1,100 non-government service providers. Together, these dedicated individuals and organisations collectively offer thousands of services to Australians living with various forms of disability.

But what exactly is the role of NDS, and how do they foster support for essential services like Yumba Bimbi? To delve into the heart of the mission undertaken by this peak body, we recently had the privilege of sitting down with NDS's Queensland State Manager, Jason Mckey.

> **HERE'S** WHAT HE HAD TO SAY:



What do you consider to be the main benefits of NDS membership for rural and remote providers?

Well, there's the policy and advocacy area that's really important. There are there are issues that every service has, but many of the things that are exacerbated more by the tyranny of distance. Workforce is a really big issue. Transport is a really big issue now. Not everywhere has got transport like Sydney and Melbourne where in half an hour you can go from one side of town to the other. We're really looking at those areas like Emerald, Clermont, Mount Isa, and the fact that there isn't enough workforce. So NDS is there to

advocate on behalf of services. Because of our size, because we're a national organisation, we're able to have a seat at the table talking with Minister Shorten and the NDIS and NDIA and the Quality and Safeguarding Commission. Also, we've set up a senior leaders rural and remote collaboration group so that people can realise they're not in this alone, that the issues that they're facing are covered whether they're in Goondiwindi, Emerald, Mount Isa, or Townsville and Cairns. We can bring people together and we can get information to members [MP's] in the rural and remote and regional areas.

Workforce issues and the ability to get allied health professionals into the regions. So that means the utilisation of plans is not as high as the as the state average in many places. It's quite simply that people can't get the service because it's hard to get an occupational therapist or a speech therapist, et cetera. So that really is one of the big issues.

The disability sector has faced prodigious change, particularly in the recent years. How has NDS navigated that change, and have you had to review or readjust its position as a peak body to accommodate the current and future needs of NDIS providers?

making sure that our members are able to understand the issues and what the recommendations are and what impact that potentially has for them. We're also waiting for the NDIS review, and we'll be certainly focusing very much on that as we come up to our annual general meeting in December. So, it's a case of doing two things, it's looking over the horizon to see what potentially is coming up now. With the Royal Commission being released, we have much clearer picture on that, but we still don't quite know exactly how the impact of registered versus unregistered providers is going to be and how we're going to work those sorts of things through, and that will come out in the in the NDIS review.

What do you consider to be the main challenges faced by rural and remote providers?

We've had a lot to do in our policy and advocacy team. We've had a lot to do with the Disability Royal Commission and we're pumping out reams of information for our members about the Royal Commission. We're distilling that down and

Yumba Bimbi's CEO Rachel Freeman is the Vice Chair of the QLD Divisional Committee. Can you tell us a little bit about what the role of the divisional committee and its members is?

Well, it is a very diverse group. Rachel is a really key person in Emerald. Our chair, Liz, is from Ingham. We have other members who are in North Burnett. So, we've really made sure that we have a diverse group of people as committee

members from right across Queensland. They're an advisory. They're an assistant to me. It's really important to be able to link in with people like Rachel to get on the ground issues and make sure that those are then sent back to our policy advocacy to ensure that we get better outcomes for people with disabilities regardless of where they're living in Queensland.

Yumba Bimbi's CEO, Rachel Freeman, was recently appointed to the role of Vice Chair of the QLD Divisional Committee.

"It's a role I feel very privileged to hold. As a member of the Committee, I value the opportunity to be a voice for rural and remote NDIS providers and participants, and to support National Disability Services in its work," she said.

Yumba Bimbi is proud to link in with the NDS to continue to provide high quality support in rural areas and create a more inclusive and supportive society for all Australians, irrespective of their abilities or their geographic location.

Wayne took us on a journey of his life, the challenges faced, the successes achieved, the challenges ahead, and the successes possible with a change of mindset in the

broader community to creating opportunities for people with disability to be employees.

As Wayne concluded his presentation, the main course arrived at the tables. A choice of a hearty beef stew & mash, or a bulging chicken pot pie were on offer, both delicious and warming as the night air began to cool rapidly. During dinner the guest artists "The Koi Boys" began harmonising so beautifully, choosing perfect songs so that dinner table conversation could still be heard. As knives & forks came to a rest on the plate,

so to the music ramped up in tempo and volume. Soon people were up dancing to the wonderful trio who covered almost every genre from every decade since the 50"s through ACDC. They really were outstanding, playing for several hours, and having almost everyone up on the dance floor at various times.

Changing the Landscape

It goes without saying that employing people with disability can change lives. The financial, social, and health benefits to them, their families, and the community are clear.

What may not be so well understood, are the benefits and opportunities people with disability can create for a business. A research report published by Accenture, in partnership with Disability: IN and the American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD), found that companies that embrace best practices for employing and supporting people with disabilities have outperformed their peers.¹ In fact, these leading companies were on average twice as likely to have higher shareholder returns than their competition. There are a few reasons. One of the most significant is they don't realise they are missing out on a huge untapped resource.²

Why isn't every company creating a more inclusive workplace and culture?

Around one in six Australians are estimated to have a disability. That's 4.4 million people. Yet they are incredibly underemployed. Only 48% of working-age people with disability are employed, compared with 80% of Australians without a disability.³

What this tells us is that there's a lack of understanding of not only the untapped talent pool but also the potential benefits to business, which inluce:

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It's a win for both people and workplaces. Disability is more common than you think. It's just one of the many things that add to the diversity of people.

We know disability is part of everyday life, and we also know that disability inclusion in the workplace is good for business. Many disabilities are not always visible. With mental health, for instance, which is so prevalent in our community, the chances are a member of your team, or yourself has a disability. Yet people with disability are significantly underrepresented in Australia's Workforce.

People with disability also experience social isolation – 17% compared to 8.7% of people without disability.⁴ A secure job gives them a sense of belonging within their local community while significantly improving their health, social and economic outcomes. This, of course, flows onto their family life and reduces welfare dependency.

Changing your processes and practices to increase disability diversity and inclusion in your workplace may seem like a big task, but it's easier than you think.


